Carnser clear up. The attraction of mulled wine and minced pies combined with the prospect of heavy labour ensured a good turn-out to help with the clear up of the dinghy park in December. This was followed by a very pleasant Sunday Lunch at the Moorings.

Although currently snow is thick on the ground, it is only a month or so until the Dinghy park opens at the beginning of March. In the meantime the National Trust will cut the grass and Edward Allen will be leading a working party on Sunday the 24th February at 10:00 to prepare the Dinghy park for the 2013 season.

Sailing programme 2013. The sailing programme continues to evolve to meet members' requirements with additional rowing and social sailing complementing the usual racing programme. The season starts with racing for both rowing and sailing boats on Good Friday. The first social sailing event is on the weekend of the 11th of May.

The International 14s and 16s event is combined with a Streaker Event at the end of July. The annual fun week with a range of sailing and social activities commences on the 4th August in the midst of which the North West Norfolk Sailing Association comes to Blakeney on the 8th and the week concludes with the Blakeney Regatta on the 10th & 11th. Following last year's success, the Marsh Marathon will be run on the 17th of August with the added complication of a neap tide, so no rowing or sailing over the Marsh will be possible. This should make it far more interesting and a great deal muddier!

In order to make it easier for juniors and novices to get into racing we are, in conjunction with Norfolk etc. (the local sailing school), providing a race training day on the 18th of August so that people who would like to try racing but would like some practice and coaching, can get a chance to do this prior to the commencement of the race week on the 19th. Marine Conservation Zones. I understand that the Environment Agency have decided not to proceed with establishing a reference MCZ (rR4A) on the south side of the harbour. Had it gone ahead this would have restricted the sailing and boating activities in the harbour.

Dredging. (report from David Woodcock) Sometimes one begins to understand how Sysiphus must have felt. Last time we had the good news of the grant, and a small subcommittee was created to take the matter forward. But, as is sometimes the way, the initial meeting allowed us to get carried away and when we received the revised proposals for the scheme, the costs had gone through the roof and we all took fright and were back to square one.

As a first step a report was prepared for the Parish Council to gain their support for what we intended to try and do, and this was forthcoming. The second was to focus efforts on the Bridge sand area by straightening and deepening the channel. A meeting has been arranged with the various interested parties, The Crown (who own the sea bed), National Trust, Natural England and the Marine Management Organisation. This is due to take place very shortly and the outcome will determine whether the project has a life. I will keep you updated.

As this is all our news at this time, I look forward to the sailing season and seeing you on the water.
