Racing:

If you have not yet heard about the 2016 Seafly National Event at Blakeney and our Streaker Open Event, where have you been? The October edition of Yachts and Yachting magazine includes the Seafly event.

The North West Norfolk Sailing day at Blakeney was also a very challenging day for all classes; for example of the eight Supernovas that registered for the week only four set sail at Blakeney and of these only one finished. Richard Pakes from Haversham deserved his congratulations even though in winning he capsized three times!

56 boats sailed in the Morston Regatta and though Graham and Robin Barker in Wayfarer 888 crossed the finish line first, all participants were later declared to be winners. The Blakeney Regattas had to be postponed for 48 hours due to the storm blowing through. Even when they were held, the 28mph winds were demanding enough. First across the line on the "Saturday" Blakeney Regatta was Angela Harcourt in her Laser whilst the "Sunday" race winner was Alan Robinson who helmed with Angela Harcourt crewing in his Seafly "Merlin".

Money matters:

Dredging of the Cut:

This proposal has not gone away. The BSC committee informed the Parish Council that it did not feel that it could support or be seen to be driving forward the dredging project since it saw no real benefits to its sailors, sailing in and out of the cut. This has been a matter of disquiet for the BSC committee, the parish council, the dinghy park management committee, the BSC trustees and members of the sailing club. It is hoped that the members on the dinghy management park committee will bring to the BSC committee a form of words concerning the project that the BSC committee will be able to support.

Club Premises:

The lease for the Church Hall Room to BSC expires on 7th July 2017. BSC committee continues to monitor the negotiations between the Parochial Church Council and the club. It remains the decision of the BSC committee to call an Extraordinary General Meeting if a new lease would result in a significant increase in membership fees. The EGM would be to resolve whether or not to renew the lease. All options are being considered by the BSC committee.

Blakeney Dinghy Park Committee Regulations

- 2. No items may be left on the 'Dinghy Park' between 1st December and the 1st March. These dates are mandatory and will be strictly enforced. Owners who transgress will find their craft removed without notice even if the period is only a day. [Regulation 10 will apply.]
- 10. Boat Owners who fail to follow the regulations will be asked to rectify breaches by a notice attached to the boat requiring the breach to be remedied within 30 days. Thereafter and without further notice the boat will be removed to an open store. A fee of £50 for boats or £10 for canoes plus any costs incurred in removal is payable to secure recovery. Any craft which has not been claimed within 60 days of removal will be sold and the costs and fees deducted from the proceeds.
